The lady, Natalie came with students from different schools in Barking and Dagenham, such as: Barking Abbey, Riverside, Sydney Russell and the Warren school. We were shown a short film that included all of the issues that were discussed. Some of the films were difficult to watch and made us think about challenging issues in our society.

We learnt about FGM, child abuse and issues about our identity; this was followed by some group discussions. The assembly and CIVICs lessons have introduced us to some new ideas which we hope to learn more about.

Each year over 9,000 children are involved in traffic accidents in England alone; an astonishing figure.

Penny told us about a 13 year old boy who went to the Warren School in Dagenham. At the time of the incident, Warren School were especially strict about arriving on time to school, failure to arrive on time resulted in a detention. Due to this reason the children were very anxious about being on time. Unfortunately this boy, who was desperate to arrive on time was hit by a lorry whilst rushing to get to school. He was immediately rushed to the Royal London Hospital; luckily he was saved by the incredible doctors and nurses in the hospital and is still able to carry on with his life. However not everyone is that fortunate.

Our advice to the students of Greatfields is that to be very careful around roads and to be safe by following the simple instructions advised by Natalie: to listen, look and cross onto the opposite side of the road by **walking and not running** as it may cause an accident.

Yom Kippur is the tenth day of the seventh month in the Jewish calendar. This Jewish festival is often regarded as a day of forgiveness. Yom Kippur means the Day of Atonement in English. During this day the Jewish community contemplate about the bad or hurtful things they have done and try and make up for it.

Also, observing Jews fast for 25 hours. According to Jewish tradition, God inscribes each person's fate for the coming year into a book, the Book of Life, on Rosh Hashanah (New Year), and waits until Yom Kippur to "seal" the verdict. During the Days of Awe, a Jew tries to amend his or her behavior and seek forgiveness for wrongs done against God (*bein adam leMakom*) and against other human beings (*bein adam lchavero*).

The evening and day of Yom Kippur are set aside for public and private petitions and confessions of guilt. At the end of Yom Kippur, the Jews hope that they have been forgiven by God.



When Jews break there fast it is normally an event with the family enjoyed with a lovely meal which includes an array of salads.

We wish everyone a Happy Yom Kippur and hope that we can all forgive each other.
